three guests (not Chapter members) were DEP employees. More DEP interaction I think is a good thing. After dinner, John Murray explained some of the pitfalls of mold recognition and testing. You could tell he was speaking from a number of personal experiences. Nick Zackeo spoke about the CHMM credential and its importance to Connecticut stormwater permitting and aquifer protection.

Later that month, John Rie, Paul Simonetta, Larry Secor, David Jermakian, Winston Brown, and Nick Zackeo ran the Chapter Booth at the CBIA conference on March 31st. I heard the conference was lightly attended but our booth got enough interest to give away most of our literature. We use this conference as a way to publicize our organization to a wider audience of Connecticut businesses and solicit more members. Winston was a good sport in that he managed to deliver the booth containers to the conference in his vehicle which was already full of his work equipment. Thanks for "fitting us in", Winston. John and Winston again successfully thwarted disaster as they were able to erect the booth without written directions. I'm sorry I don't photos of that.

On May 6th we held a breakfast meeting at which we presented a couple of waste management topics (rated number one in the 2004 survey. Nick Zackeo presented the new CT Universal Waste Rule and yours about Satellite Accumulation Area talked management.

In August we met with two CTDEP Bureau Chiefs to let them know about our credential and explore ways in which CHMMs may serve their mission. Simonetta and Nick Zackeo and myself met with Mike Harder and Ozzie Inglese. We came away with a strong feeling that the CHMM role in compliance certification is a real possibility and an agreement to continue communications.

In September we hosted a seminar on Emergency Preparedness in Connecticut presented by Patrick McCormack, the Director of Health in Norwich/Montville area. It was held at the Northeast Utilities Office conference room in Middletown. Despite the light attendance, there was a lively discussion after the presentation that you can do only in a small group.

Also in September a number of Chapter members attended the National Conference in St. Louis. John Murray gave a presentation. I was the Chapter Delegate and had to go to a couple of business meetings. While I thought they might be boring, I found them to be very informative. I really would like another Board member or a member who might be interested in being more active in the Chapter to act as delegate this year. Remember, that you get your conference fee waived if you go as a Chapter Delegate. In 2006 the conference will be held in Orlando Florida. Isn't that incentive enough? A CHMM IN ST. Louis

The National Conference was held in St. Louis in September 2005. attended as your Chapter Delegate along with about a half-dozen other CTCHMM members including John Murray who was a presenter at a technical session. The event was held in a part of a renovated historic train station in downtown St. Louis within walking distance of three huge sports venues. Most attendees stayed at the hotel within the facility but I had the pleasure of staying at a place about a half-mile down the road. For the most part, the city was very walkable.

During the first day of the conference, I attended a Chapter Development Meeting. I learned that our Chapter is one of 21 that owe the National Organization documents such as Articles of Incorporation and we will run the risk of getting our

Charter revoked if we don't provide them soon. It was also indicated that CHMMs may be refused CMPs for attendance at these Chapter events. Stu Manley has since taken on the important task and is finding his way through the quagmire of paperwork to make this happen for you. Major announcements included that the Academy has gone global. The India Chapter is the first international group to apply for a Charter. A program called CHMMunity started by the North Star Chapter conducts community outreach projects through member donated resources. Check out their website if you are interested. The Cyberchapter for those who want to participate in chapter events through cyberspace, currently has 92 members. This was seen as a major accomplishment.

The technical sessions at the conference that I attended were all very good, though the number of sessions has been reduced from previous conferences that I attended.

They replaced some of the technical sessions with large general sessions with paid professionals and regulatory authorities. There was a general session in which we learned some interesting things about human behavior and safety. Another lively session happened when an attendee challenged an EPA representative as to why the All Appropriate Inquiries regulation called out P.E. specifically as qualified to certify the work but did not name the CHMM even though the CHMM would qualify under equivalent experience clause. Roger Dangerfield would say, "we get no respect."

We had a Conference-sponsored outing one evening that took us to the City Museum which is truly unique. It is literally a museum of the city of St. Louis. In recent times the city has torn down a lot of old buildings with interesting architectural features. The museum stores and displays the items that were salvaged in an old industrial
